## The case against putting up a Lib Dem candidate in the Police and Crime Commissioner Elections for the South East.

## 1. Policing leadership should <u>not</u> be a party political issue.

We are concerned that the newly elected Police and Crime Commissioner, posts which our party did not support in the first place, should be protected from party political posturing. We note how the other parties are desperate to ensure that 'their' side controls police and crime oversight. We believe this to be a worrying trend. In our view the role should be free from party political interference. However, if we are loath to see party based Labour and Conservatives Commissioners, with allegiance to their head offices, it also has to be the case for the Liberal Democrats.

It is not good enough for a party of principle to say simply that because other parties are putting up candidates we should also. The Liberal Democrats should be in opposition to the party politicking of the role on the grounds of principle. We should reflect that principle by refusing to put a candidate up ourselves.
